Maggie was known for her cooking, baking, sewing, gardening, quilting and crafting, playing cards and hosting wonderful neighborhood get-togethers. Maggie is survived by her husband of 47 years, Jim; beloved children, Jim of Davenport, IA, Ann Marie (Pete Keely) of St. Paul and Susan

(Tom Kampa) of Shoreview; one precious granddaughter, Addison Keely; sisters, nieces, nephews and many many friends. She is preceded in death by her parents; sisters, Ann Skerjance, Carol Skoff and Mary Burbank and brother Anton Nemanick.
